

Prime Minister Nabbanja Leads Uganda's Delegation to the 79th UN General Assembly 2024, in New York.

New York - The 79th Session of the United Nations General Assembly commenced formally in New York on 10th September 2024 with the installation of its new President, H.E. Philemon Yang of Cameroon.

The High-Level Week of the General Assembly was conducted through the General Debate themed: "Leaving No One Behind: Acting Together for the Advancement of Peace, Sustainable Development and Human Dignity For Present & Future Generations."

Uganda's delegation was led by Rt. Hon. Robinah Nabbanja, the Prime Minister of Uganda, and included Hon. Gen. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Hon. Oryem Henry Okello, Minister of State for Foreign Affairs (International Affairs), Amb. Adonia Ayebale, Permanent Representative of Uganda to the United Nations and Senior Officials responsible for Foreign Affairs, Health, Finance, and Environmental matters.

The Prime Minister stated Uganda's current Chairmanship of G77+China is an opportunity for countries of the South to articulate their collective economic interests and enhance joint negotiating capacity on issues within the UN system.

She also remarked about Uganda House in New York, which hosted the "High-Level Africa Youth Forum" on the margins of the Summit.

The high-level week of UNGA whose main objective was to rally and make a plea for stronger, sustained international cooperation in the face of global shocks occasioned by multiple-human, natural, ecological, sociological, and financial crises.

The final outcome document of the Summit of the Future was the global commitment or pledge expressed as the "Pact of the Future" with its 60 action points.

This Pact was the outcome of painstaking negotiations by the various interest groups within the United Nations, including the NAM and G77 plus China, of which Uganda had played a pivotal role in steering, guiding, and generating consensus among these influential groups as their concurrent Chair.

Hon. Oryem Ignites Innovation at the 2nd Indonesia-Africa Forum.

Jakarta - Representing President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni at the Second Indonesia-Africa Forum (IAF) II in Nusa Dua, Badung, Bali, Minister of State for International Cooperation Hon. Henry Oryem Okello highlighted the importance of the Non-Aligned Movement's cornerstone principles in fostering global peace & prosperity.

Minister Okello emphasized the need for global economic growth and sustainable development, especially in sectors like Agriculture and digitalization to empower youth and drive progress. He lauded the strong relations between Indonesia, Uganda, and Africa at large.



Addressing challenges such as climate change, Hon. Oryem stressed the balance between mitigation efforts and economic advancement for developing nations.

He also highlighted the potential for SMEs to transition to industrialization and the tourism sector's growth opportunities, drawing from Indonesia's success.

In addition to delivering the President's statement, the Minister shared insights during a panel discussion themed "Outlook from the Region Update and Prospect for Cooperation" at the forum, focusing on collaboration between Indonesia and Africa for mutual growth and prosperity.

PS Bagiire Visits Geneva: Eyes Digital Economy, Cotton Value Chain, Diaspora Engagement.

Geneva - The Permanent Secretary of Uganda's Ministry of Foreign Affairs Mr. Bagiire Vincent Waiswa, paid a working visit to Geneva from 18-24 July during which he held a number of bilateral meetings with officials from the World trade Organisation (WTO), UN Trade and Development (UNCTAD), the International Trade Centre (ITC), the South Centre, and the members of the Uganda Diaspora.

He expressed gratitude to the WTO for its continued support and stressed the need to strengthen collaboration to harness intra-African trade potential for a landlocked least-developed country (LDC) like Uganda. PS Bagiire emphasized key challenges such as market access, particularly sanitary and phytosanitary (SPS) standards, which impede Ugandan products from reaching international markets.



He also called on the WTO to assist Uganda in digitalizing its economy and helping micro, small, and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) access digital platforms. The PS/FA also expressed Uganda's interest in joining the WTO-World Bank Africa Digital Infrastructure Project & the Trade in Services for Development Project.

WTO Deputy Director-General Johanna Hill responded positively, explaining that the Africa Digital Infrastructure Project, currently in its pilot phase across five countries, would expand at the end of 2024 to include new participants. She confirmed that Uganda could express interest in the second phase of both projects.

Additionally, Amb. Stephen Fevrier of the WTO-FIFA Further meetings were held with Ms. Dorothy Tembo, Cotton Partnership discussed Uganda's interest in joining the cotton value chain project, initially designed for four African countries. Amb. Fevrier noted Africa's \$1 trillion cotton market potential & invited Uganda to participate in the World Cotton Day celebrations in Benin, October 2024.

During a meeting with Dr. Edwini Kessie, Director of Agriculture at WTO, PS/FA acknowledged the critical role of the Standards and Trade Development Facility (STDF) in enhancing Uganda's SPS capacity. He emphasized the importance of strengthening domestic policies and institutions.

Economic Affairs Officer Aichetou Ba highlighted ongoing STDF projects in Uganda, including work on citrus fruits and fisheries. PS Bagiire also met Dr. Carlos Correa, Executive Director of the South Centre, who outlined the Centre's support for developing countries through research, negotiations assistance & capacity building. Dr Correa assured PS/FA of the Centre's continued advocacy Uganda's development interests.

Deputy Director-General of the International Trade Corporation (ITC), and Ms. Luz Maria de la Mora, Director of International Trade and Commodities at UNCTAD.

Ms Tembo praised Uganda's collaboration with ITC, noting 14 ongoing projects, and discussed support for MSMEs and women's empowerment in e-commerce. De la Mora offered to strengthen Uganda's partnership with UNCTAD, especially in implementing the African Continental Free Trade Area (ACFTA).

Finally, the PS/FA met with Mission staff, including Permanent Representative Amb. Marcel Tibaleka, to discuss bilateral and multilateral work where the Mission is increasing engagement with Switzerland to boost economic and commercial ties. The Mission is working in 40 international organizations, including Uganda's chair of the Non-Aligned Movement and G77 and China, to enhance their visibility and relevance in Geneva.

Kampala - The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Uganda on September 13, 2024 had the honour of hosting a high-level delegation from the National Defense College, Mirpur, Bangladesh, currently undertaking a study tour in Uganda. The 14-member delegation, led by Group Captain B M Hassan Mahmud, afwc, psc, GD(p), arrived in Uganda on the September 8 2024 as part of their Armed Forces War Course 2024.

The study tour aimed to deepen the delegates' understanding of Uganda's foreign policy, defense cooperation, and governance structures. At the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, they received a warm welcome and an insightful lecture from Dr. Sam Omara, Minister Counsellor, on Uganda's diplomatic engagements and peace initiatives.

The delegation also engaged with officials from the Ministry of Defense, visited the National Enterprise Corporation, and explored Uganda's strategic sectors. They later toured Jinja to gain further insights into Uganda's industrial and military capacities. This visit highlighted the strong relationship between Uganda and Bangladesh and their commitment to fostering deeper cooperation.

Uganda & Mozambique Forge Stronger Bonds at Joint Permanent Commission Meeting.

Kampala - In a display of camaraderie and historical connection, senior officials from Uganda and Mozambique gathered in Uganda for the 2nd Session of the Uganda-Mozambique Joint Permanent Commission. The meeting, led by H.E Pascoal Pedro João Ronda and Hon. John Mulimba, graced by dignitaries including Ambassadors of both countries, aimed to bolster bilateral cooperation and explore areas of mutual interest.

Discussions at the meeting covered a range of topics, focusing on regional and international issues, peace, security, and sustainable development. Both delegations emphasized the importance of historical ties and vowed to expand cooperation, especially in combating terrorism and transboundary crimes.

The signing of Memoranda of Understanding in areas like Veterans and Combatant Management, wildlife protection, and visa exemptions was a cause for celebration. Technical officials were tasked with ensuring the swift implementation of these agreements and finalizing additional MOUs in defense, trade, agriculture, energy, and ICT by the end of 2024.



As the Second Session of the Uganda-Mozambique JPC concluded, Minister Mulimba expressed gratitude to Minister Ronda and the Mozambican delegation for their fruitful participation. Minister Ronda, in turn, thanked Uganda for its warm hospitality and eagerly anticipated hosting the next JPC in Maputo in 2026, underscoring the ongoing commitment to strengthening ties between the two nations.

VP Jessica Alupo Reaffirms Investment Opportunities for China in Uganda, during meetings at the FOCAC 2024 in Beijing.

Beijing - Uganda's Vice President H.E. Maj (Rtd) Jessica Alupo reaffirmed the country's openness to foreign direct investments, welcoming partnerships from Chinese investors and collaborations between investors and the Ugandan government.

She made these remarks on September 3, 2024, during a meeting with a delegation from China Henan International Cooperation Group (CHICO), a major foreign trade enterprise, on the sidelines of the 2024 Summit of the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC). VP Alupo highlighted CHICO's contributions, such as their 2012 contract for the Gulu-Atiak road and other development projects.

The Vice President expressed optimism about CHICO's potential to contribute to Uganda's priority sectors under National Development Plans (NDP 3 and 4), which include agro-industrialization, tourism, mining, oil, gas, and innovation. CHICO CEO Xie Hui noted the company's extensive global footprint, having completed over 800 projects in Asia and Africa.

In a similar meeting, VP Alupo welcomed AVIC-INT and China CAMC Engineering, acknowledging their efforts in establishing cottage industries and electrifying industrial parks. Dr. Elaine Kiew, head of the delegation, introduced AVIC-INT's energy storage solutions, while Foreign Minister Odongo Jeje Abubakhar encouraged the companies to explore cassava-based power generation.

Uganda Strikes Game-Changing Deal with China to Elevate Coffee to World Stage.

Relatedly, Uganda's coffee industry is set to achieve global recognition following a key agreement with China Communications Construction Company (CCCC). Three Ugandan companies—Platinum Commodities, Enkumbi Terimba, and New Cafe—signed a Memorandum of Understanding with CCCC in Beijing, witnessed by high-ranking Ugandan officials including Vice President Jessica Alupo and several ministers.

In her remarks, Vice President Alupo emphasized Uganda's rich coffee heritage, producing both Arabica and Robusta coffee, and projected that Uganda will export 20 million coffee bags annually by 2025. She highlighted the partnership's potential to create jobs and contribute to the country's economic growth.

CCCC President Tang Shun underscored the longstanding diplomatic ties between China and Uganda, established in 1962, and CCCC's involvement in Uganda's infrastructure projects like the Kampala-Entebbe Expressway and Entebbe Airport. The company is keen to support further development in line with China's "One Belt, One Road" initiative.

The agreement aims to boost Uganda's coffee exports and strengthen Uganda-China relations, positioning Uganda as a reliable, high quality coffee supplier on the global market.

Uganda Appointed Vice President of the Asian-African Legal Consultative Organisation.

Bangkok - Uganda's Attorney General (AG), Kiryowa Kiwanuka, has been appointed Vice-President of the Asia-Africa Legal Consultative Organisation (AALCO) during its 62nd annual session in Bangkok, Thailand.

Themed "Advancing the Development of International Law through Asian and African Leadership," the session highlighted the regions' roles in reshaping global legal discourse.

AG Kiwanuka's appointment underscores Uganda's growing influence in international law and dedication to fostering cooperation across Asia and Africa.

Established in 1956, AALCO provides a platform for legal collaboration among 47 member states.

Speaking at the session, Kiwanuka acknowledged the historical Eurocentric dominance of international law and commended the organization for empowering Asia and Africa as equal contributors to the global legal order and emphasized Uganda's commitment to AALCO's mission of promoting legal cooperation.

This milestone strengthens Uganda's legal diplomacy and paves the way for future collaborations with key international bodies such as the United Nations and African Union, reinforcing Uganda's leadership in advancing equitable solutions in international law.

Uganda-DRC Border Reaffirmation: A Pathway to Stability & Economic Growth.

Goma - From 2nd to 6th September 2024, Senior Officials from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) and Republic of Uganda held a significant Joint Technical Committee (JTC) meeting in Goma, aimed at reaffirming their common border.

The meeting, organized in close cooperation between the two governments, took place in a cordial environment, free from security threats, allowing for constructive discussions. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Uganda played a central role in coordinating Uganda's participation, ensuring the successful execution of this crucial diplomatic engagement.

A major achievement of the meeting was the development of a comprehensive roadmap and budget for the reaffirmation of approximately 817 kilometers of the shared Uganda-DRC border.

This effort is vital for maintaining peaceful relations and clear demarcation between the two countries. To date, only 44.8 kilometers of the border have been reaffirmed, specifically the 28-kilometer stretch from Offo/Vura and the 16.8-kilometer section from Sarambwe/Bwindi. These milestones reflect progress, though there is still much to be done to fully reaffirm the entire border.

One of the critical discussions involved the clarification that 22 Uganda Investment Authority (UIA) pillars along the Kisoro/Bunagana area are not boundary markers. This discovery resolves potential disputes and highlights the importance of technical expertise in such exercises. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs facilitated the dialogue that enabled this issue to be addressed in a diplomatic and transparent manner.

The reaffirmation exercise, once completed, is expected to strengthen cross-border cooperation, create a detailed topographic map of the border, and install permanent boundary pillars. The joint field activities for this exercise are projected to cost USD 3,142,260, with Uganda and the DRC agreeing to share the expenses.

Previous budgetary allocations for boundary reaffirmation in Lake Albert and Lake George, discussed during a 2018 meeting in Entebbe, also provide a framework for financial planning. These efforts are part of a larger commitment to regional stability and cooperation, areas in which the Ministry of Foreign Affairs continues to be instrumental in advancing Uganda's interests.

Looking ahead, the JTC has agreed to begin the reaffirmation exercise in May 2025, with a follow-up meeting to be held in Kampala. This timeline reflects the long-term nature of border management and the ongoing need for careful coordination, a role that the Ministry of Foreign Affairs will continue to oversee.

In addition to border reaffirmation, the meeting shed light on economic opportunities in Goma, which, despite ongoing security challenges, has emerged as a key economic hub. Several Ugandan companies, such as Movit and Lato, have already established a strong presence in the region, benefiting from the market potential of the densely populated Kivu area.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs, through its economic and commercial diplomacy initiatives, has been pivotal in supporting Ugandan businesses to explore and capitalize on these opportunities. A well-organized business forum in Goma, facilitated by the Ministry, would further expose Ugandan traders to the potential for market expansion.

However, security concerns remain a challenge for trade, with many traders having to use longer, less secure routes, impacting their business operations. Despite this, the region's demand for Ugandan agricultural products remains high, making it a lucrative market for continued engagement.

The JTC concluded with several important recommendations. The governments of both Uganda and the DRC were urged to allocate the necessary funds for the border reaffirmation exercise. Additionally, a joint military effort was proposed to clear and secure the border areas before and during the reaffirmation process. These recommendations underscore the collaborative approach needed to ensure a successful outcome, with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs at the forefront of steering these efforts toward mutual benefit.

Sudanese Refugees Plan Festival to Honor Uganda's Exceptional Refugee Policy.

Kampala - A delegation from the Community of Sudanese Refugees in Uganda, accompanied by Amb. Dr Rashid Yahya Ssemuddu, the Head of Mission from the Uganda Embassy in Khartoum/Port Sudan, visited the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA) on 11th September, 2024.

They sought government involvement in a festival to honor Uganda for its exceptional refugee policy, which they praised as unmatched across Africa.

The delegation, representing the High Council for the Sudanese Community in Uganda, shared their appreciation for Uganda's welcoming stance towards refugees, noting the ease of settlement and investment opportunities compared to other countries.

They revealed that the Sudanese community has registered 2000 small businesses and 200 large enterprises in Uganda, with plans to invest in schools, hospitals, and real estate.

The proposed festival, named "Thank You Uganda," aims to express gratitude to the government and its people. Ambassador Ssemuddu, alongside MoFA officials, welcomed the initiative and highlighted President Museveni's message that Sudanese refugees are considered brothers and sisters. He encouraged the group to submit a formal request through the Permanent Secretary's office for further engagement.

Uganda's Economic Potential Shines at UK-Africa Business Summit.

London, UK - Uganda's economic prospects were front and center at the 14th UK-Africa Business Summit on September 6, 2024.

The event, organized by Ugandan diaspora leader Mr. Willy Mutenza, in collaboration with the Uganda High Commission in London, attracted high-profile participants discussing trade, investment, and tourism opportunities.

In his opening remarks, Uganda's Deputy Speaker of Parliament, Rt. Hon. Thomas Tayebwa, underscored Uganda's strategic appeal for global investors.

Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Finance, Ramathan Ggoobi, presented Uganda's ambitious economic expansion plan, forecasting growth to \$500 billion within 15 years.

Sectors such as agro-industry, tourism, and minerals, alongside science and innovation, were highlighted as key drivers for this growth, projected to generate billions in annual revenue.

The UK government reaffirmed its commitment to supporting projects in East Africa, with financial institutions like Euro-Exim Bank promising funding for Ugandan trade ventures.

With trade between Uganda and the UK surpassing \$100 million in the 2023/24 financial year, the summit serves as a crucial platform for expanding bilateral partnerships, fostering innovation, and empowering entrepreneurs, including women-led businesses.

Government officials, business leaders, and CEOs from both Uganda and the UK joined forces to build on this momentum, reinforcing Uganda's role as a rising economic hub in Africa.









Uganda Embraces International Standards with the Launch of Metro Bus Service for Airport Connectivity.

Entebbe Municipal Council has unveiled plans to launch a metro bus service connecting Kampala with Entebbe International Airport, aimed at modernizing public transport and improving connectivity.

The Entebbe Mayor Fabrice Rulinda highlighted the initiative's goal of enhancing travel for residents and visitors, particularly for airport commuters who currently face difficulties, such as walking long distances with luggage. The metro buses will provide a direct, comfortable route to the airport, alleviating these challenges.

The project, aligned with Uganda's urban mobility objectives, seeks to offer world-class infrastructure that benefits both tourists and locals. Though local taxi drivers have raised concerns about competition, the council assures that the metro service will complement existing transport, not replace it.

The buses will run on a schedule, coordinated with the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA), and drivers under training to meet international standards. With an initial fleet of 20 buses already in place, the service is set to launch on October 9 2024.

This initiative positions Uganda alongside global cities like New York and Tokyo, which offer efficient airport transit. It also reflects Uganda's commitment to sustainable, green transport and its ambition to remain competitive as a growing destination for tourism and international business.

Using the same platform, the State Minister for Kampala Capital City and Metropolitan Affairs, Kyofatogabye Kabuye, said the majority of the taxis in Uganda are costly, inefficient and unreliable in terms of time-saving. "Through the launch of the Metro buses that will commute from Entebbe Airport to Kampala at a specific time, these will reduce the congestion of taxis in the city centre and will also save time," Kyofatogabye said.

He noted that as a ministry, they need to see how quickly they can avail affordable services to the people in terms of transport. "We have decided to start with Entebbe because the majority of the people face a challenge in accessing the airport and the East side of the city," Kyofatogabye said adding that they opted to start with Entebbe because it is one of the municipalities that has visionary leaders.

Robert Nyasimi, the chief executive officer of RentCo, said if the bus usage is well embraced, many Ugandans are likely to get employed as drivers for the buses. The buses are blue in colour, have CCTV cameras, and will have security personnel guarding the commuters and their belongings during their travels.

Uganda Airlines Launches Direct Flights to Abuja, Boosting Bilateral Ties & Economic Cooperation.

Touching down and taxiing to water cannon salutes cheers, dancing and jubilation at both the Kenneth Kaunda and the Robert Gabriel Mugabe International Airports on September 24th 2024, flight UR 720 to Harare via Lusaka marked 5-year old Uganda Airline's 15th and 16th destinations.

The Uganda delegation aboard the flight was led by the Minister of Finance, Planning and Economic Development, the Hon. Matia Kasaija received by Hon. Museba Frank Tayali the Minister of Transport and Logistics of the Republic of Zambia.

"It is my hope that improved air connectivity between our countries will support a vibrant travel market that facilitates better business, trade and tourism linkages between Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe".

In Lusaka, Hon. Museba welcomed the commencement of flights from Entebbe as an important milestone in the Zambian aviation industry further reaffirming that Zambia recognizes Uganda as a key strategic partner in promoting economic development, trade and investment between the people of the two nations. "The commencement of flights will enhance the already existing business linkages and create opportunities to promote tourism, trade and foreign direct investments in Zambia and Uganda," he said.

At the Robert Gabriel Mugabe International Airport in Harare, High Commissioners Paul Amoru (Uganda) and Winpeg Moyo (Zimbabwe) emphasized that the flight would strengthen people-to-people connections and support regional integration. "As members of the East African Community and the Southern African Development Community, Uganda and Zimbabwe are working towards enhanced connectivity that fosters economic growth and development," said Amb. Moyo.

Rare Relics of Uganda Martyrs Unveiled in Kampala after 138 Years.

In a move that will boost religious tourism in Uganda, rare relics of the Uganda Martyrs have been unveiled after 138 years in a historic exhibition at Uganda Martyrs University

(UMU)'s Rubaga Campus. The launch of this 47-day exhibition took place on September 14 before a select cohort of invitees who included the chief guest and Minister of Tourism, Wildlife & Antiquities, Hon. Col. (Rtd.) Tom Butime.

The exhibition is part of the theme: "God and Caesar: A Historical Exhibition Celebrating the 60th Anniversary of the Uganda Martyrs' Canonization," which commemorates their canonization by the Catholic Church in 1964.

These relics hold deep religious and historical significance for Uganda, as they are not just physical remnants of martyrdom but symbols of faith, sacrifice, and national identity. Additionally, the jawbone of Matia Mulumba and relics of Charles Lwanga, classified as 'First Class' relics, are part of the collection, further enhancing the emotional and spiritual impact of the exhibition.

The unveiling of these relics for the first time in over a century offers a unique opportunity for Ugandans and international visitors to reflect on the profound legacy of the martyrs. The launch of the historic exhibition was highlighted by a compelling panel discussion centered on the theme "God and Caesar" exploring the intersection of faith and secular authority, reflecting on the Martyrs' legacy and its relevance in contemporary contexts.


In a panel discussion, the Chief Curator, Dr. David Tsimba, observed that the commemoration of the Martyrs led to significant changes in the Catholic Church, including its democratization and a profound rational and spiritual renewal. "Following June 3rd celebrations, women were finally permitted to join church choirs, and songs in local languages, rather than just Latin, were introduced. Additionally, traditional instruments were subsequently allowed in church services," he revealed.

According to panelist Prof. Ssemakula Kiwanuka, the conflict between God and Caesar did not begin in Uganda. It has been a global issue across generations. He noted that Pope Paul's visit to Uganda was not solely due to its designation as the "Pearl of Africa," but rather because of the significance of the Martyrs.

On his part, panelist Prof. Lwanga Luyingo from Makerere University observed that the Uganda Martyrs' story was not coincidental, as our ancestors had a profound spirituality even before Christianity. "There were similarities between traditional beliefs and Christian teachings, suggesting that these parallels may explain why Christianity gained such traction," he noted.

But according to Fr. Dr. Vienne, one of the panel discussants, the story of the Uganda Martyrs sheds a glorious light on the history of Uganda and was a true martyrdom. The event was inaugurated by Hon. Tom Butime, who revealed that the cabinet had decided to take charge of Namugogo as a facility of great national and international significance.

At the launch, the VC Prof. Patrick Kyamanywa announced that the Uganda Martyrs University Nkozi will host the grand canonization celebration on October 18, 2024, at the university's Nkozi campus. He revealed a library dedicated to the martyrs will be established at the campus to position the university as a central hub for scholarly work on the martyrs. This ongoing exhibition promises to be a landmark in preserving Uganda's historical and religious heritage. At the end of the exhibition, the relics (one pictured, right) will be returned to the Vatican in Rome.

Karuziika Palace, the Heartbeat of Tooro Kingdom's Legacy and Rich Cultural Heritage.

The Karuziika Palace, nestled on Karuziika Hill overlooking Fort Portal Town on the picturesque Kabarole Hill in Fort Portal, is more than just the official residence of the Omukama (king) of Tooro; it's a living embodiment of the Tooro Kingdom's rich cultural heritage.

The Royal Home was built in 1963 during the reign of Omukama Sir George Rukidi III, the 11th King of Tooro, upon the restoration of Kingdoms. The first palace was called "Kakwamwemi", meaning the one that ended the war.

Muammar Gaddafi, the former Libyan leader, contributed to the restoration and renovation of the palace. His involvement came about in the early 2000s when he financially supported the refurbishment, helping to restore it after years of neglect following the abolition of traditional monarchies by the Ugandan government in 1967.

The palace's history is a testament to the resilience of the Tooro Kingdom. After being destroyed in the 1960s, Karuzika was fully restored in 2001, symbolizing the strength and revival of Tooro's royal heritage. This resilience is not just a historical fact; it's a living reality embodied in every stone of the palace.

The palace is more than just a building; it's the heartbeat of the Tooro Kingdom's cultural life. From enthronement ceremonies to royal gatherings, Karuzika Palace is where the most important Tooro cultural events take place. The recently concluded EkyootoHaMpango24, marking 29 years since Omukama Rukirabasaija Oyo Nyimba Kabamba Iguru Rukidi IV became King at the age of three, is just one example.

According to Tooro tradition, the king is supposed to stay in the palace alone, and when he marries, the wife is just called upon as he wishes. Separate quarters are built outside for his servants, princes, and princesses.

In the Tooro culture, one enters the palace from an entrance called "Ilembo," and "Mugaba nte "is the chief entrance to the palace. "Omusanga is the royal pala or chief veranda where the King sits on cultural functions. One of the most interesting things to see is the royal drum called "Kisurumbi", which is stationed at the royal palace from 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. When the king is around, it is sounded to inform his subjects of his presence.

A lady called "Omuranga" sits next to the "omusanga"; her role is to protect it, and she is the only one allowed to touch it. Karunga Lillian is the third generation daughter from the Bahinda clan to become the Omusanga since it is hereditary in nature.

The Karuzika Palace is not just a landmark; it's a living chapter of Tooro's royal legacy, quietly nestled in the hills but brimming with stories. Next time you find yourself in Fort Portal City, don't just pass by-let the palace show you what resilience looks like, where every stone has a story waiting to be told.

Buganda Kingdom's Iconic Kasubi Tombs Reopens Gates to the Public.

The Kasubi Tombs are open again after 14years, welcoming visitors to share in the rich history and cultural treasures. Located in Kampala, the tombs sit on 30 hectares of hillside, serving as the final resting place for Buganda's Kings. The site is an architectural marvel, made from organic materials and celebrated for its unique construction and intanaible cultural values.

This sacred burial ground for Buganda's kings, had been closed after a devastating fire in 2010 that had ravaged the main building, leaving the site in disrepair and halting tourism. UNESCO stepped in, declaring the site endangered and providing aid for restoration.

After years of hard work, the Kasubi Tombs have been removed from the endangered list, thanks to the reconstruction of the main funeral building, restoration of the guardian's house, and installation of a state-of-the-art fire-fighting system.

With the reopening, the Buganda Kingdom and Ugandan government are eager to share this cultural gem with the world, attracting tourists and generating income. The Kasubi Tombs are once again a place of wonder, spirituality, and connection to the past.



About Kasubi Tombs: Located on nearly 30 hectares of hillside in Kampala, they serve as the final resting place for Buganda's kings. At the heart of the site lies the former palace of the Kabakas, built in 1882 and converted into a royal burial ground in 1884. The site includes the Muzibu Azaala Mpanga, a circular building topped with a dome, which houses the tombs of four Buganda kings.

An architectural marvel made from organic materials like wood, thatch, reed, wattle, and daub, the Kasubi Tombs are celebrated for their unique construction and intangible cultural values, such as belief, spirituality, continuity, and identity.



MoTIV Empowering Uganda's Jobless Young Adults with Wood and Metal Skills to Boost Job Prospects.

In an interview with Mr. Ombe Luther Kahanguzi, the head of the wood and metal department at MoTIV, a creators space in Uganda, he discussed the reasons for establishing wood and metal as a separate division within MoTIV.

He mentioned that in the wood and metal domain, they typically offer two types of programs: "Upskilling and One-off trainings."

MoTIV sets up boat camps in locations like slums, churches, and schools to identify skill gaps in mechanics and plumbing, carpentry, welding among others.

Trainings last for three months and have impacted over nine hundred students for an enrollment. Under the upskilling program, MoTIV focuses on practical skills for students with theoretical knowledge. Training lasts six weeks, ending with certificate issuance to all trained students.

Mechatronics is a sector in wood and metal producing high-quality goods like electric bicycles, televisions, smartphones, and motorcycles. It caters to skilled students with a professional demeanor.

In the discourse, Mr. Ombe discussed providing a maker space for trainees with access to machinery, exposure opportunities, and interactions with artisans and entrepreneurs in woodwork and metalwork. This is accomplished through four pillars: the Academy, production, maker space and market space.

MoTIV focuses on branding and marketing to the younger generation, shifting youth mindset, promoting patience in learners before entering workforce. They collaborate with institutes to impart skills to students.

The teams that participated in the tournament included; Rwamwanja Queens from Kamwenge, Tagy High School from Entebbe, Jinja City Queens which is also the official women team of BUL, King of Kings, Agojo Star Girls and Pagirinya young Ladies from Adjuman district.

Kilikumwino scored a brace as her team was playing against Fort portal-based King of Kings SC team during a final game of the TICAD Cup held at FUFA Technical Centre, Njeru in Buikwe district on Saturday.

The TICAD Cup 2024 tournament aimed at empowering women through sports

saw Jinja City Queens defeat King of Kings 2-0 after full time, to clinch the Championship.

King of Kings started on a good note as they displayed good techniques against their opponents and dominated the first 20 minutes of play in the first half.

But the game changed after Kilikumwino, while in the area, headed straight in the back of the net after a corner kick from the left wing by Teddy Nyafwono, sending team mates into jubilation. After a five-minutes span, Kilikumwino headed inside her second goal from a left corner kick by Nyafwono in the closing moments of the first half.

Prior to scoring her brace, Kilikumwino and Nyafwono directed shots towards King of Kings goal keeper, Cecilia Kamuli, who punched the balls over the bar several times & managed to grip a few.

During the second half King of Kings SC's chances of scoring were too minimal as Jinja City Queens did a lot of defending.

In the two Semifinal games that were played in the morning, Jinja City Queens beat Tagy High School 4-2 in penalties after a 1-1 draw of full time as King of Kings defeated Pagirinya Young Ladies SC 1-0.

"I feel happy because we worked as a team to score the two goals I did not get any challenges while playing and we challenged them mentally as they used a lot of vigour during play," Kilikumwino said.

Rashur Aliamba the head coach of Jinja City Queens said he was excited after his team winning the TICAD Cup 2024 championship adding that they strategized properly and prepared for the final game. Aliamba noted that teams were really good but the determination of his players helped them to achieve whatever they wanted.

The coach of King of Kings, Rogers Ayesiga, admitted losing to Jinja City Queens 2-0 in head ball situations, two corners and conceded two goals. "We are now going back to the drawing board to work on the set pieces and it did not go well because the girls somehow forgot to mark during set pieces because they had several of them when they were heading the ball when they were free. So that is a homework for us the coaches to go back to improve on that area," Ayesiga explained.

Hadija Balinabyo who emerged top scorer in the tournament with 4 goals said the tournament was so competitive in that all teams exhibited their best during play but for their side, they managed to take the championship after following instructions from their coaches.

The first edition of the TICAD Cup women football tournament was won by King of Kings in 2022, the second edition was won by Kawempe Muslim SS in 2023 and Jinja City Queens emerged winners for the 3rd edition in this 2024 year.

The chairman of BUL FC Ronald Barente, Inoue Yoichi, the Chief Representative of JICA Uganda Office, John Chrysostom Kalibala the Honorary Executive Member at FUFA and also responsible for development of women football at FUFA; and Margaret Kubingi the Uganda Women Football Association (UWFA) chairperson handed over the championship trophy to the Jinja City Queen team.
